### **KATSU, JHOROS, #15252**



I got my amateur radio license for the first time in July 1992 and I got amateur fourth-class radio operator. After that, I got a third-class radio operator for general services and a second class radio operator for general services for work. I wanted to work the correspondent because I wanted to communicate with Morse code. However, when qualifications are acquired at the company's training institution and assigned to the site, it is less likely that Morse code will actually be handled before GMDSS starts.

For that reason, if there is only amateur radio available in the future, since the operating range of the advanced amateur radio is included with the qualification that he had, he rewritten the radio station license letter and started Morse communication with the amateur radio . At that time, I could not get out of short wave, mainly Morse communication was done at 50 MHz (6 m). This was a lot of fun, I enjoyed it by moving operation. However, as work became busy and married, temporary amateur radio once closed

However, the time has come, I can afford to home and work, so I resumed amateur radio. We got various wisdom to OM who we got acquainted with, and it became possible to operate in shortwave. 




I use a telegraph-key from 18 years old.



When I started ham radio in 1983 I mainly worked on 21MHz and enjoyed rag-chew with same generation operators in SSB. Some of these young guys were enthusiasts for CW mode, which I never thought to work in at that time. They talked to me how it is interesting to work DX in CW on 40m band. They had a 2nd class license and I was so inspired to get an advanced license.

Then I got a license with code. One day I visited JARL's office in Nagoya, JA2 area and operated event station in CW. I was so glad when one female staff talked to me, "Great! You use paddle by left hand" That comment encouraged me a lot. After that I knew she was a famous CW operator.

My first contact in CW was back in 1985. Unfortunately I had no chance for another QSO with him over 30 years. But surely he was enough kind operator so that I kept to stay in this CW world.

If you ask to name who is my elmer for CW, these above mentioned hams come up to my mind. I appreciated them so much.

### HIRO, JI2GZC, #15148

JA2BCQ, Suzuki OM is my CW master. It was JA Field day contest in 2009 when I heard his signal for the first time. He was timelessly moving through the band from low to high frequencies and making QSOs. When he found open frequencies, he called CQ there at the speed of 30wpm. I was really shocked to hear the operation. I took my 3rd class amateur license at the beginning of 2009 and I could copy CW of only up to 10wpm. Although I could not copy CW of JA2BCQ, I decided to be like him some day. This was the moment of my start of the devotion to this "game" of CW contest which I enjoy to date.

### MY CW MASTER, TAK, JS1QIZ, #15150

My CW master is JA8YP, Mr. Horikawa. Although I met him only a few times, he was the person who taught me basics of straight-keying hand-in-hand. I already had the 1st class amateur license, but I decided to start from the scratch following his detailed advice. Thanks to this, my keying speed gradually increased up to about 25 wpm which allowed to me to pass radio operator exam some years later. Although I do not use straight key much these days, I believe I still remember the feeling of his hand when he grasped my hand for teaching.

Have you ever tried a sked? It is a scheduled QSO with a specific station. A time, frequency and mode (CW, of course!) are discussed in advance. It is finished one time in the case to contact with a rare station for awards. But on the other hand, it is regularly repeated in the case to contact with an Elmer, friend or club member. I think a regular sked is a good way to improve a QSO skills, especially for beginners. To enjoy Morse communication, a beginner must learn Morse codes first and then must call a high speed station on the real band. Generally, they feel lonely and nervous. At worst, they give up Morse communication before they find it very interesting. But if there is a person who keep trying together, a beginner also keep trying without giving up.
